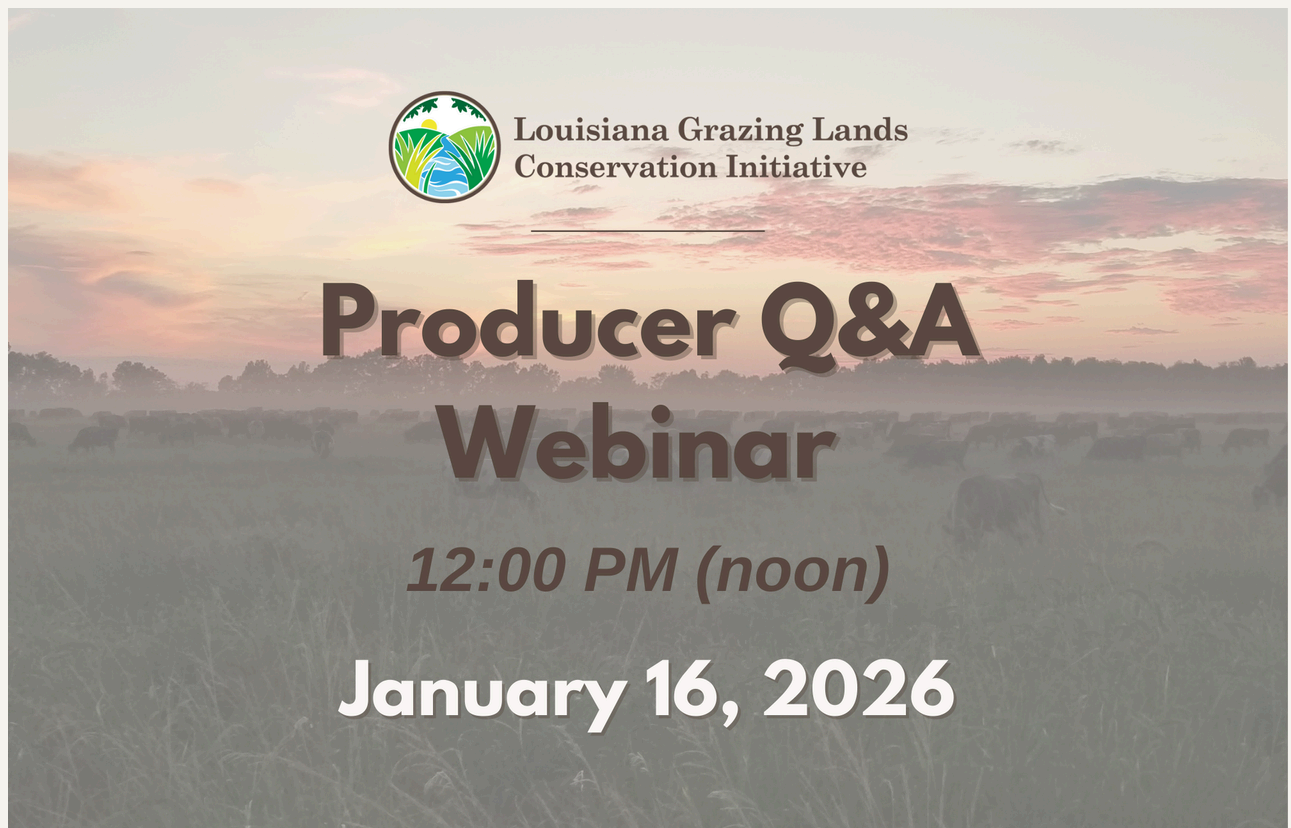




Happy New Year from LGLCI!

Miller Cattle Company: Doing What Works For Them in Northeast Louisiana

Bubba Miller is a self-taught and capable handyman. He and his wife, Amy, have built Miller Cattle Company from scratch throughout the last 10 years in Northeast LA, clearing some wooded hilly land and reclaiming it as pasture for their beef cattle and hair sheep.

IMPORTANT NRCS and GRANT Updates

NRCS 2026 DEADLINE: Jan 15th

NRCS programs, particularly EQIP, are very helpful cost-sharing reimbursement grants that help farmers and ranchers add ecologically-helpful infrastructure to their farms that they own or operate.

If you are AT ALL interested, you must fill out a simple 3 page application form by Jan. 15th. Drop the [application](#) off to [your regional office](#).

VIRTUAL FENCE has been approved as cost-share practice in Louisiana!

Details are coming from NRCS, but we have received only verbal confirmation that virtual fence is very recently approved as a cost-share practice in Louisiana NRCS programs going forward.

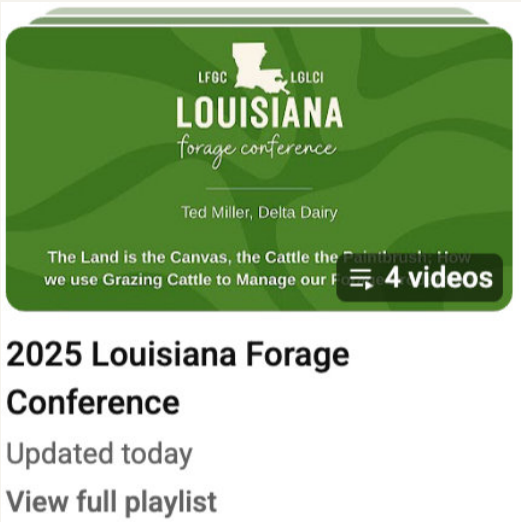
Value Added Producer Grants (VAPG Federal Grants) Open Jan 15-April 15

VAPG is a USDA program that helps independent agricultural producers develop value-added products, create new markets, and increase income by funding business planning and working capital for processing, marketing, and food safety certification, transforming raw commodities into higher-value goods like jams, biodiesel, or unique branded products. In grazing operations, this could look like addition of direct sales, expansion of a farm-to-table business, and many more things. It's a complicated process to apply. 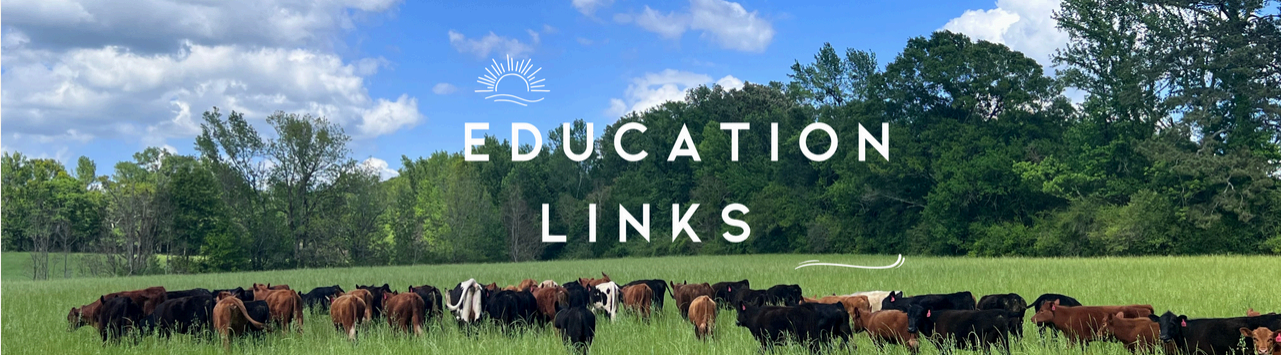
